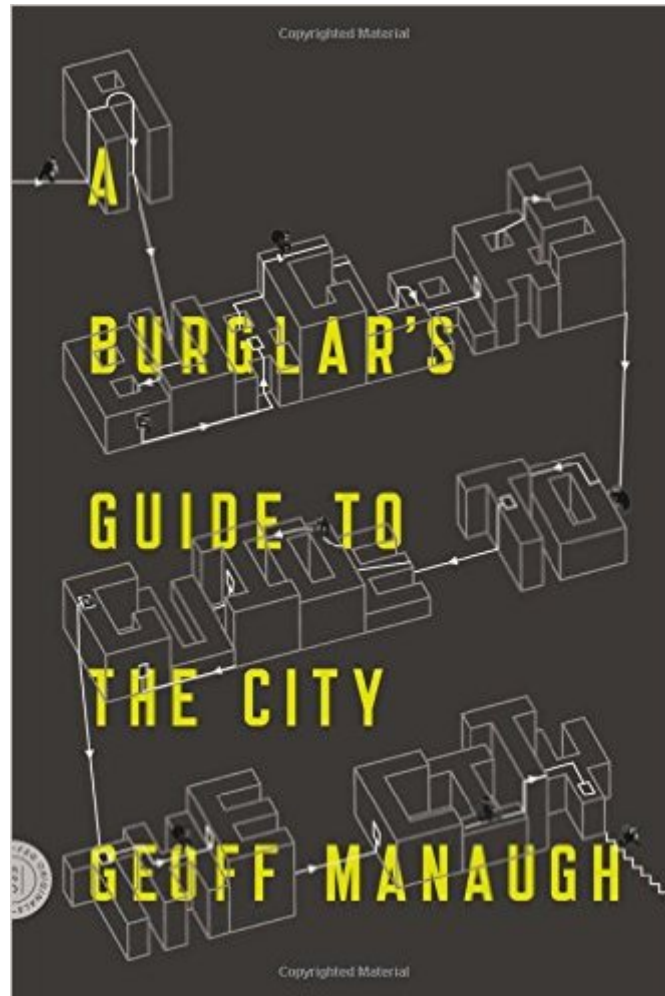

The FBI defines burglary as 'the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.' The world, it seems, is infested with burglars. Author Manaugh goes back nearly 2,000 years to cover some of the earliest break-ins and escapes, always commenting on the linkage between architecture, how

the crimes were committed, as well as how they were caught. The bad news is that his largely anecdotal approach lacks an integrative thread. Nonetheless, Manaugh begins with the story of an architect who used his training for dishonesty. George Leonidas Leslie moved to New York in 1869, trained as an architect at the University of Cincinnati, where he graduated with honors. Leslie and his gang were estimated to be behind 80% of all bank robberies in the U.S. at the time, until his betrayal in 1878. This included the Manhattan Savings Institution heist of October 1878, netting nearly \$3 million from what was believed to be one of the most impregnable buildings in North America. Leslie planned the heist for over three years, but was murdered by one of his own crew before he could participate. Leslie would dress well and wheedle his way into private gatherings and case the locations. 'Oh, I'm an architect. I'd love to see the blueprints for your new bank downtown. I'm working on one downtown. If I could just take a quick look, I'd be most appreciative. Do you have the plans here?' One of his partners was Fredericka Mandelbaum - she had a dumbwaiter installed inside a false chamber in her home chimney, where she could stash sensitive items in a rush. Her home had multiple entrances, unmarked doors, armed guards, and even a disguised access point through a pub across the street. She also owned a cluster of warehouses in Brooklyn where she would store, hide, and sell stolen merchandise.
