
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British Warship Recognition: The Perkins Identification Album: Volume I Capital Ships 1895-1939





Synopsis

In the inter-war years Richard Perkins, an amateur photographer and avid collector, amassed one of the worldâ [™]s largest personal collections of warship negatives. He eventually donated the collection to the National Maritime Museum, where it still forms the core of the historic photos naval section. While he was actively acquiring photos, Perkins found that many were neither identified nor accurately dated, so he began to compile an album of his own drawings, which incorporated as much detail as possible on individual ships that could be amended as he discovered more information. This project grew into an enormous resource covering virtually every Royal Navy ship from 1860 to 1939, when security restrictions forced Perkins to stop work. This project material was also donated to the National Maritime Museum, where it was bound into eight large folio volumes that became a key reference for the curators of historic photos, but unknown and almost inaccessible to the interested public. As a result, the actual publication of the volumes is an event of utmost importance for every enthusiast and ship modeler. These albums will be important to every enthusiast and ship modeler, who will now be able to own a copy of this unique and invaluable reference work for the very first time.

BRITISH WARSHIP RECOGNITIONThe Perkins Identification AlbumsVolume 1: Capital Ships 1895-1939This beautifully produced, large format book consists of many coloured drawings of British warship profiles. They show only the external features of the ships, as seen from a considerable distance, to enable the observer to identify the ship. The introduction notes that the author-photographer-artist, Richard Perkins, was the foremost expert in identification of British warships until his death in 1985. He was a talented photographer who took many photographs of the ships. Three of these appear on the frontspiece. Since this book is an accurate reproduction of one of Perkinsâ Â[™] albums, the pictures are all hand drawn and coloured, and photographs are unfortunately not involved. The drawings themselves are attractive, but they are technical drawings, not art. Since the album is essentially a catalogue, the style is constant throughout. The drawings provide no sense of scale or size and the only visual viewpoint is a strictly lateral one of the full length of the ships sides. Frankly, for this reader, they became a bit boring. There is minimal information about the history of each ship, except where and when it was seen, and details of modifications to the shipâ Â[™]s external appearance which might assist with its identification. For obvious reasons, the collection of information ceased in 1939. Ship modellers might find the detailed drawings of details such as funnel shapes and mast geometry useful, but they will be frustrated by the total lack of dimensions and scale. Unfortunately, I cannot recommend this book for the reader who is interested in naval history and ship construction but I am sure that it will appeal to naval book collectors and bibliophiles.
